Nellie Duke to Present Mayhayley Lancaster Film January 19th at Stallings Community Center at 6:30



The January 2017 Carroll County Historical Society speaker is one of our own members, Nellie Dunaway Duke. Nellie has been an active member of the society for many years and was awarded the University of West Georgia 2015 Living Legacy Award. She recently was featured in the film *Mayhayley Lancaster, Legend of an Oracle* produced by Rick Fowler. Nellie will be showing the film and telling about the research she did a couple of decades ago while planning to write a book on Mayhayley.

Nellie studied at the Carroll Lynn School of Business and Chicago University and worked in Sales and Marketing for the JC Penney Co. and later as Department Manager for Sears. She has also

been a Semi-Pro Basketball Player (1947-1948), Basketball Coach, PTA President, Girl Scout Leader, Boy Scout Den Mother, Church Youth Counselor, Recreation Department Teen Director, Advocate for Women's Rights, and Volunteer for Homeless Veterans.

In 1949 Nellie married Henry Duke. Prior to his death, Henry presented a wonderful CCHS program on railroading and the Carrollton Depot. Nellie is also famous for her delicious Nellie's Jellies, which became a breakfast specialty of the Sunnyside Café..

Nellie has five children, ten grandchildren (some of which she shares with Eddie Trewhitt because her son married Eddie's daughter), and several great-grandchildren.

Those attending the program will be offered the opportunity to comment on their experiences and memories regarding Mayhayley Lancaster. If you have anything to share, please bring it with you to the meeting– photographs, stories, etc.

Mayhayley Lancaster, Legendary Oracle of the Ages

Mayhayley Lancaster's story is legendary, not only here in West Georgia where she lived, but throughout the nation! Her modest country home was in Heard County, only accessible by a small unpaved road. She is buried in the cemetery at Caney Head Methodist Church, the church she attended without fail every service.

Born in the late 19th century, Mayhayley started adulthood in a stunning way for a woman of that era. She attended law school in 1911, and became one of Georgia's first female attorneys. She also taught school for a while. In 1924 she ran for office in the Georgia Legislature, unheard of for women in Georgia at the time. Of course, she did not win, but continued to try again in 1926 and 1928! While she is mostly known for her "fortune-telling", as a medium, soothsayer or "oracle", she stands out in Georgia history as a pioneer in the women's movement!

Everyone knows about the assistance she gave to law enforcement and the judicial system, especially that chronicled in the movie, "Murder in Coweta County". Her charges to those asking for her advice were usually based on " A Dollar for Me, and a Dime for My Dog!" Her fame lives on, even though she died in 1955, and books have been published, articles written and movies produced featuring her fame and powers. Virtually every resident of adjacent areas know someone who experienced contact with Mayhayley Lancaster!

Rick Fowler, former Bowdon resident and well known musician, grew up hearing of her unusual powers, and decided to produce, along with his wife, a documentary film entitled **Mayhayley Lancaster**, **Legendary Oracle of the Ages**. It premiered last year at Bowdon's Copeland Hall.

Nellie Dunaway Duke, local resident and women's rights activist, will present the program. Since 1992, Nellie Duke has served the Georgia Commission on Women, twenty three of those years as Chair. She founded women's groups and institutions, including Georgia Women's Institute, West Georgia Women's Forum, Georgia Women's Museum, Inc., and Ratify ERA Georgia, along with others. A frequent speaker throughout Georgia, she serves on boards of sixteen organizations, receiving honors and awards from local, state, national and international institutions, most recently at Fort Benning in Columbus.

Easy Sausage Skillet:

Ingredients:

1 pkg Hillshire Farm smoked sausage cut thin on the diagonal
2 cloves of garlic, crushed
1/4 cup olive oil
1 large red bell pepper, sliced thin
1 small yellow onion, sliced thin
1 pkg frozen broccoli,thawed
1/2 cup of chicken broth or water
1/2 cup tomato sauce
2 cups instant rice, cooked per package instructions
1/2 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese

Instructions:

Heat olive oil in skillet, stir in smoked sausage slices and cook until browned. Add pepper, onion, broccoli, broth and tomato sauce and simmer for 10 minutes until the vegetables are tender and the liquid is absorbed. Stir the cooked rice into the skillet, sprinkle with cheese and serve.

The property was the site of Dr. Steve Worthy's home and later was donated to the city for a park by Dr. Peter Worthy who grew up in the house. The park is located at the corner of Dixie Street and West Avenue in the Carrollton Intown Historic District.
